We're happy to share API Forward Movement's new Impact Report with you. It was another year of growth and if you're receiving this, you played a key role in supporting our programs as a partner, funder, donor or volunteer - so thank you!

In 2023, we continued to engage communities through our food and environmental justice programs. Food Roots Harvest, our regional food hub maintained relationships with farmers, produce recovery and composting organizations to deliver culturally relevant produce to lowincome neighborhoods, clinics, schools, food pantries and restaurants. Food Roots Nourish continued with CalFresh education and enrollment (check out our CalFresh bingo card on page 8), vaccination outreach and developed a new Farm to PreSchool project. Sustainable San Gabriel Valley (SSGV) hosted an exciting new Environmental Justice Summer Institute for SGV youth and continued to engage residents on clean air and a multi-benefit stormwater capture project. We also worked to improve access to open spaces, language justice and informed an LA County public works equity initiative.

Looking ahead, we continue our commitment to improving APIFM as a good place to work through staff development training focused on facilitation skills and community engagement, as well as our ongoing focus on pay equity.

CALFRESH HEALTHY LIVING COMMUNITY FOOD HUB

CALFRESH HEALTHY LIVING (CFHL)

Our team facilitated access to free gleaned produce for low-income, people of color communities in LA County through meaningful approaches and cultural accommodations while simultaneously reducing food waste by diverting gleaned fruits and vegetables from landfills to dinner tables. Produce was distributed through 12 CBO, clinic, park, and school partners. Additionally, inedible produce was composted by two local partners.

Here are our 2023 accomplishments:

- 171,140 lbs of produce distributed
- 2,618 lbs of food waste reduction
- 3 CBO partnerships
- 3 local park partnerships
- 3 local school partnerships
- 3 community healthy clinics partnerships





COMMUNITY FOOD HUB

Access to culturally relevant foods is critical to the food justice work we do.

Over the past year...

- We sourced and distributed over 125,000 lbs of culturally relevant produce
- Provided **\$187,500** to local Asian American farmers

We distributed to over **18 institutions**, including:

- Local hospitals
- Schools
- Restaurants
- Nonprofits
- Faith based organizations
- Affordable housing units.

It's been a wonderful partnership that's been well received by our clients, many of whom are elderly Asian immigrants who appreciate foods that they are familiar with and know how to cook and enjoy.

Community Health Workers (CHWs) hosted and supported four vaccine events and launched a public immunization campaign in collaboration with Pacific Islander Health Partnership to encourage ongoing access to vaccines. CHWs continued to connect with community members through food distribution, healthy food preparation and CalFresh enrollment partnerships with faith based organizations that serve the Samoan & Tongan communities.

CALFRESH OUTREACH & EDUCATION

We worked with community members from all walks of life, ranging from young families, people helping their elderly parents, college students, small business owners, older adults to people who are unhoused. We helped people to gather necessary documentation, and connect with the Department of Social Services to successfully submit their applications to receive CalFresh benefits. Our work didn't end there, we followed up, showed people how to use their EBT card to buy culturally relevant produce, and helped people renew their benefit status.

We connected with over 100 community members about CalFresh benefit enrollment











FARM TO SCHOOL

This program launched at 5 underserved pre-schools in the San Gabriel Valley and Koreatown.

280 kids learned about healthy food and gardening through hands-on learning like:

- Singing
- Dancing
- Taste-testing
- Gardening

Families received:

- 5 lbs of free produce each month
- DIY home gardening kits

Families participated in:

- Quarterly healthy food workshops
- An annual community garden tour

Schools grew over 50 seasonal fruits and veggies!



SUSTAINABLE SAN GABRIEL VALLEY

APIFM collaborated with Nature for All to bring 26 elders from Chinatown to the Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve. Many elders face culturally relevant language access barriers when trying to access nature.

Our community members appreciate this program because we offer:

- Opportunities to connect with others
- We hosted 4 hikes with 68 community members in LA this year.




AIR

The Clean Air SGV team engaged residents in Alhambra and Monterey Park, focusing on residents in disadvantaged neighborhoods and near high-pollution areas. This collaborative effort raised awareness, identified community "hotspots," and led residents to participate in our air quality studies, underscoring the community's active role in the Clean Air SGV project.



This year, the Tobacco Prevention (ToP) team's CAPITALISE project made valuable progress in uncovering disparities in tobacco policy adoption across LA & Orange Counties. Our dedicated Community Advisory Board ensures our project resonates with the API communities we serve. By working together, analyzing real-world data, and developing community-driven solutions, we empower API communities to advocate for change and reduce the burden of tobacco-related health issues.



WATER

Water is Life (WIL) engaged the SGV community on water education and water capture in 2022 & 2023, developing infographics, blogs and videos in Chinese, English, Spanish and Vietnamese, and the distribution of rain barrels to residents. This led to the development of a multi benefit water capture project around Fremont Elementary School with a primary focus on addressing pedestrian safety & air quality concerns due to the school's proximity to the I-10 Freeway Ramp.

WIL collaborated with 135

community members to develop a multi-benefit water capture project.

We secured 120 public comments to advocate for safer streets in Alhambra.

ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE SUMMER INSTITUTE (EJSI)

The program equipped 15 high school students to become environmental justice champions and the next generation of leaders for a healthier, more just future. Participants learned firsthand about environmental inequalities affecting their communities by exploring:

- Air quality & pollution

LA COUNTY PUBLIC WORKS EQUITY IN INFRASTRUCTURE INITIATIVE LANGUAGE JUSTICE CHINATOWN FOOD ECOSYSTEM PROJECT

LA COUNTY PUBLIC WORKS EQUITY IN INFRASTRUCTURE INITIATIVE

APIFM was one of five anchor CBOs who collaborated with the Liberty Hill Foundation to identify and address disparities across LA County in the planning, delivery, and distribution of Public Works investments and services. APIFM engaged with 600+ community members through workshops, surveys and focus groups.



LANGUAGE JUSTICE

APIFM advocated for language justice through multiple coalitions including participation in the LA County Department of Public Health, Center for Health Equity's Language Justice Workgroup and the Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander Language Access & Health Equity Collaborative, a statewide coalition led by Asian Resources Inc. APIFM developed a language rights flier and role of interpreter flier which was translated into 13 API languages in collaboration with over 8 API community based organizations.

CHINATOWN FOOD ECOSYSTEM PROJECT

The Teen Council at the Chinatown Branch Library collaborated with APIFM to distribute over 2,900 lbs of fresh Asian produce and 2,210 eggs to 110 residents in single room occupancy units and assess Chinatown's local food resources and ecosystem.
